Does the Bible have anything to say about care of the environment? Yes, without question! I believe that all of us have been given the privilege of sharing in God's creative activity. "God blessed them and said: Prosper! Reproduce! Fill the earth! Take charge! Be responsible for fish in the sea and birds in the air, for every living thing that moves on the face of the Earth" (Genesis 1:28).

God has given this world to us as a home where we live as tenants. This beautiful dwelling is furnished with an abundance of resources to meet our basic needs. We can enjoy these good gifts, but we also have a responsibility to our Landlord – God himself.
